



News from Norwood Chapel

Dear Friends.

Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

I would like to wish you and yours a very happy Easter. May we rejoice in the power of God's love defeating the power of evil and death through the resurrection of Jesus Christ. "Love" and "new life" are God's final words. May we all receive blessing on top of blessing this Easter.

We have come a long way over this past year with the pandemic. The vaccine and booster have dramatically improved our everyday living and much of normal life has resumed. My family and I have high hopes of seeing our own family in-person for Easter . . . it will be the first time we will have met up with them in nearly three years. This reunion can't come soon enough.

As excited as I am about that, my mind can't help but think of the people of Ukraine. At the time of writing this article, the Russian invasion is now entering the third week. Things may look a bit different come mid-April. But I wonder what will Easter be like for Ukraine? Will they still be a sovereign country with President Zelensky and their government? I pray so. Will their cities, town and land be totally devasted? I pray not. Will their spirit be broken to such an extent that their hope for the future has died? Only God knows.

And what about all the Ukrainians who are dispersed, living in foreign lands, including here in the UK? Will their hearts be filled with songs of resurrection on Easter morning? Has their faith in God and in humankind been shaken to its core? Their traumatic exodus and suffering have most likely changed their lives in permanent ways. Their old lives (life before the invasion) are now gone; what will new life look like for them? I have many questions but no answers. I will have to wait and see how things unfold.

But in the meantime, I can pray and do what I can to help. We all can do this. I encourage you to find a way to donate financially or to give in any way you can to aid the nwharfemidbenefice.ol humanitarian crisis that is before us. Let us also remember to pray for the Russian people; many are shocked and saddened by the war. Many are protesting and this puts them in harm's way. Please join me in praying for world peace with this prayer from the Methodist Connexion:

Holy and Gracious God,

We pray for the people of Ukraine and the people of Russia; for their countries and their leaders.

We pray for all those who are afraid; that your everlasting arms hold them in this time of great fear.

We pray for all those who have the power over life and death; that they will choose for all people life, and life in all its fullness.

We pray for those who choose war; that they will remember that you direct your people to turn their swords into ploughshares and seek peace.




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All in the month of April

It was: 150 years ago, on 2nd April 1872 that Samuel Morse died. This American artist and inventor helped develop commercial single-wire telegraph systems and co-developed Morse code.

125 years ago, on 3rd April 1897 that Johannes Brahms, German composer, piano virtuoso and conductor, died.

100 years ago, on 3rd April 1922 that Joseph Stalin became leader of the Soviet Union, in succession to Vladimir Lenin.

90 years ago, on 23rd April 1932 that the Royal Shakespeare Theatre opened in Stratford-upon-Avon, replacing the one that burnt down in 1926.

75 years ago, on 1st April 1947 that the school leaving age in the UK was raised to 15.

Also 75 years ago, on 16th April 1947 that the term 'Cold War' was used for the first time when American financier and presidential adviser Bernard Baruch described the relationship between the USA and the Soviet Union.

65 years ago, on 24th April 1957 that the first episode of the British astronomy series The Sky at Night was broadcast on BBC TV. It became the world's longest-running TV series with the same presenter (Patrick Moore) until his death in December 2012. The series then continued with new presenters.

50 years ago, on 11th April 1972 that the first episode of the radio comedy panel game show 'I'm Sorry I Haven't a Clue' was broadcast on BBC Radio 4. It is still running.

40 years ago, on 2nd April 1982, that the Falklands War began when Argentina invaded the Falkland Islands. A British victory, although Argentina continues to claim sovereignty over the islands.

30 years ago, from 5th April 1992 to Feb 1996 that the Siege of Sarajevo took place, during the Bosnian War.

Also 30 years ago, on 15th April 1992 that the President of Afghanistan, Mohammad Najibullah, was forced to resign when his regime collapsed. Islamic rebels seized power on 28th April.

Also 30 years ago, on 23rd April 1992 that the world's largest McDonald's fast -food restaurant opened in Beijing, China.

Also 30 years ago, on 27th April 1992 that Betty Boothroyd became the first

that Betty Boothroyd became the first female Speaker of the House of Commons. 25 years ago, on 5th April 1997 that the Grand National steeplechase was disrupted after the IRA sent coded bomb warnings. 60, 000 people were evacuated from the Aintree course and the race was postponed until Monday 7th April. Also 25 years ago, on 13th April 1997

Also 25 years ago, on 13th April 1997 that the American golfer Tiger Woods, e@wash aged 21, became the youngest player to win the US Masters championship, and the first African American to win.

20 years ago, on 1st April 2002 that the became the first country to legalise euthanasia.

I have a poem which is dear to my heart. It was on a small plaque in my Grandmother's bedroom and I learned it by heart at a very early age. . Heather Rayner



The Birds in Your Garden



Courtship Feeding

Whilst reading Mike Tom's book "Garden Birds" which my daughter gave me for Christmas, I came across a springtime activity of which I was vaguely aware, but knew little - Courtship Feeding. As a human activity it most likely means taking someone you fancy to a good restaurant, but in the bird world it's a little more complicated (or maybe not!)

Many male birds provide food for their mates as part of pair bonding, hence the name courtship feeding. In reality though, it is something of a misnomer occurring most frequently when true courtship is over, and continuing during egg formation, laying and

incubation. It is a valuable source of nutrients for the female. In Blue Tits, for example, males can provide up to 40% of a female's total food intake in the period leading up to laying. Early hatching has a positive effect on the success rate of breeding in some species and the provision of extra nutrients may well be a primary driver of this behaviour It could also be that the male bird brings food to the female to demonstrate how well he could provide for any chicks she may produce.

The female solicits food from the male by uttering a sharp, monosyllabic call,

by partly lowering her wings and then quivering excitedly. Her demeanour being very much that of a fledgling Robin soliciting food from its parents.

In a few species, notably some finches and gulls, the male regurgitates food for the female, as he would when feeding young. Any discussion about birds and courtship has to include the Woodpigeon somewhere, let's face it, they never stop, and they too indulge in courtship feeding in this way, though it's not something you often see.

In your garden you are most likely to see courtship feeding between Robins. When a female finishes building a nest, her mate starts bringing her food. He does this several times a day, and increasingly often, as incubation progresses. This has many advantages in that the female is kept in better physical condition during the energetically demanding egg formation period, and then during incubation has less need to leave the nest to feed, reducing the chances of being predated both for herself and for her eggs. Nearer the end of incubation, she may receive almost all her food from her mate.

Most of us have Robins in and around our gardens, and they are more common than you might think in most woodland edges and hedges, so there's good chance that you might see the initial stages of courtship feeding. If you are lucky enough to know the whereabouts of a nest that you can watch without disturbing its occupants, patience may well be rewarded by first-hand observation of the male bringing food for his mate.

Clerk has written the HBC resident solicitor to seek further auidance reference who is responsible for maintaining this area of Common Land. After some discussion it was proposed Cllr Shepherd seconded Cllr Chivers and unanimously resolved that from the 1st April the Clerk pay scale should be revised to LC1 ref SCP point scale 15 which is more in line with the current Clerk duties.

The HBC annual free bulb scheme was

Gardeners Corner

At last Spring is arriving and will be here with a vengeance! However, we still need to proceed with caution as there will doubtless be some late frosts. It is too early to plant out those inviting bedding plants – that job can wait until May. Now is the time to prune hardy Fuschias and to cut right back the colourful stems of Cornus (Dogwood) and Salix (Willlow) to ensure their gorgeous colours next winter.

Later in the month sweet peas can be sown outdoors and the autumn sown plants, once hardened off can be planted out. Hardy vegetables, such as carrot, beetroot and spinach can be sown directly into prepared ground in the veg patch and those potatoes which have been chitting since February can be planted out later in the month – Good Friday is always a good guide. Courgettes can be sown in the greenhouse or bright windowsill, but do wait a bit longer before attempting to sow beans. For runners, my father always used to say "4th of May for a dainty, 12th May for aplenty". Sometimes it's hard to be that patient, but worth remembering!

The weeds will be germinating as the soil warms up and garden pests will also be encouraged, so do watch out for aphids and slugs. Hopefully if you have been feeding the birds, they will do the aphid work for you. Make sure they have clean feeders topped up with seeds that can be fed to fledglings without choking them and provide them with fresh water daily. Finally enjoy the season – it may be hard work but it is wonderful to see Mother Nature at work after a dreary winter!


