
Have a look at the words of the Christmas Carol, "O Little Town of Bethlehem." Here are three lines of this carol to reflect on:


















The Birds in Your Garden



Long range autumn migration is now pretty much finished, barring severe weather conditions in northern Europe. Our summer visitors are long gone, to be replaced by a selection of different species, a mix of increased numbers of resident species plus a variety of others looking for less harsh conditions and more food. Many of these new arrivals will move around until they find areas that are to their liking, and so which ones we see in and around our gardens will depend on what sort of winter we have

To give a flavour of the variety of birds which might turn up in our gardens, albeit maybe only on passage, and especially if we have a longish cold spell, what follows is a synopsis of the British Trust for Ornithology's October migration blog.

Redwings arrived on the east coast. in huge numbers in October, with sightings of over 30,000 individuals in a single day at some migration hot spots. Followed a little later by Fieldfares, their "blackjack" calls could be heard as small groups arrived from Fennoscandia. Both of these thrushes will spread inland over the next weeks and months.

Although the Mistle Thrush might not spring to mind as a migratory species, breeding populations across much of north-eastern Europe desert these freezing regions in winter and head south and west to warmer climes. They arrive during September and October, but in small groups as opposed to the vast flocks in which Redwing and Fieldfare migrate. Other species we don't typically think of as migrants such as Robin and Dunnock have also

been seen arriving in numbers.
Starlings too come over to avoid harsh winter weather, and more may yet appear, particularly if there are consistent east winds.

Each autumn, flocks of Woodpigeons heading south are a common sight all across the UK. Where they come from and where they go to are still not fully understood. However, it's thought that some birds arrive in the UK from north-west Europe, whilst some of 'our' breeding birds head south to winter in the oak forests of Portugal. During late October flocks were widely reported, and included increasing numbers of Stock Doves, closely related to Woodpigeons, but smaller and lacking the white bars on the neck and wing.

Goldcrests, although small, are surprisingly tough, weighing only around 5 grams – the same as a 20p coin – thousands of these feisty birds migrate from Fennoscandia across the North Sea to the UK each autumn. It was once believed that they hitched a ride on the back of migrating Woodcock, which make the same journey at a similar time of year.

Finch species, including Chaffinch, Goldfinch, Lesser Repoll, Siskin and Brambling all saw an increase in reports. Others on the move included Meadow Pipit, Skylark, Reed Bunting, and Pied Wagtail. The number of Brambling migrating to the UK each year varies depending mainly on food availability. Keep an eye out for their white rumps seen in flight which distinguish them from the Chaffinches they often accompany.

Back in early October, huge numbers



of Coal Tits were recorded moving south across north-western Europe. Among the most astonishing records was a report of 69,000 passing through Hanko Bird Observatory in southern Finland on 1 October. This irruption moved westward, bringing more of these delightful birds to our shores.

Garden birds make up only a minority of the vast number of birds of many species which undertake a risky migration twice a year, but in the process they bring a fascinating variety



to our gardens. Eyes and ears pealed and binoculars to hand then!

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All in the month of December

It was:

800 years ago, on 25th December 1223 that St Francis of Assisi created the first nativity scene, in Greccio, Italy, after visiting Jesus' birthplace in the Holy Land. It proved enormously popular and inspired other communities to stage their own nativity scenes.

250 years ago, on 16th December 1773 that the Boston Tea Party took place in Massachusetts. American patriots boarded ships and threw chests of tea belonging to the British East India Company into Boston Harbour, as a protest against the British tax on tea.

200 years ago, on 23rd December 1823 that the poem *The Night Before* Christmas was first published (anonymously) in the Sentinel newspapers in Troy, New York. It was written by Clement Clarke Moore.

175 years ago – on 19th December 1848 that Emily Bronte, British novelist and poet, died of tuberculosis, aged 30. Best known for her only novel. Wuthering Heights.

100 years ago, on 6th December 1923 that Ramsay MacDonald became the first Labour Prime Minister. The General Election had resulted in a hung parliament, and the Labour Party had formed a coalition with the Liberal Party.

Also 100 years ago, on 31st December 1923 that the BBC broadcast the chimes of Big Ben for the first time, to welcome in the New Year. The tradition continues to this day.

80 years ago, on 22nd December 1943 that Beatrix Potter, children's writer and illustrator, died. She created animal characters including Peter Rabbit, Squirrel Nutkin, Mrs Tiggy-

Winkle, Jemima Puddle-Duck, and many more. She is less well known for her conservations work with the National Trust, her passion for the Herdwick breed of sheep and her scientific research

75 years ago, on 10th December 1948 that the Universal Declaration of Human Rights was adopted by the United Nations General Assembly.

Also 75 years ago, on 24th December 1948 that the first Midnight Mass was televised. It was broadcast from St Patrick's Cathedral in New York City.

70 years ago, on 10th December 1953 that former US Secretary of State George Marshall was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for creating the Marshall Plan. The aid package helped Europe rebuild after WW2.

65 years ago, on 5th December 1958 that Britain's first motorway, the

Preston By-pass, was officially opened.
(It is now part of the M6 and M55.)

60 years ago, on 21st December 1963 that the Daleks made their first appearance on the British science fiction TV series *Doctor Who*.

50 years ago, on 21st December 1973 that the Geneva Conference opened in Switzerland aimed at finding a

Switzerland, aimed at finding a solution to the Arab-Israeli conflict. No agreement was reached, but Israel signed a military disengagement agreement with both Egypt and Syria in 1974.

40 years ago, on 10th December 1983 that Polish Solidarity leader Lech Walesa was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. (It was accepted by his wife, as he feared he might not be allowed back into Poland if he travelled to Norway to accept it.) Norway to accept it.)

Leathley Parish Room – The Early Years

Leathley Parish Room – the tale continues

On 31 December 1925 Mr Frederick Hawksworth Fawkes signed a "Deed of Gift" giving the Parish Room, and the parcel of land on which it stands, to the Trustees of the Parish Room. The Deed of Gift stipulated that the Parish Room should be available without charge for the purposes of a Sunday School, and was to be used for "lectures, concerts, dramatic performances and other public or private entertainments". The trustees at that time were the Reverend James Hubbard, George Henry Skirrow, John Lambert Lupton, Joseph Edmund Rogers and Fanny Linda Greenwood. It appears that the preparations for celebrating the gift were not rushed, as the minutes a year later, on Dec 16 1926, record the proposal that the committee make arrangements for the formal handing over of the Parish Room by Mr Fawkes, to be a followed by a Parish Tea for the residents of Leathley, Farnley, Castley and Lindley.

The first Parish Room Social Evening and Supper was held in November 1929, followed by fortnightly suppers during the winter. During the winter of 1929, the state of the piano became a matter of concern. The Parish Room was heated by a coke stove, and was continually damp, so no wonder the poor piano suffered. Meanwhile the committee continued with suppers, whist drives and dances. As another reminder that not much is new, it was decided that the committee needed to investigate a licence for the dancing and for dramatic performances, something the present committee undertook about 5 years ago!

In 1931 Miss Whitely and Miss Mackenzie started fortnightly dancing class, profits going to Parish Room funds. However, the committee insisted that one committee member be present at all times. Reading between the lines of the minutes, I think there must have been a little bit of resentment, as participants thought this showed a lack of trust. The committee however stood firm, and took turns to oversee the potentially riotous dancing class.

Care of the room continued to present problems. Ventilators were fixed to the roof in 1931. Redecoration and curtains for the platform were needed. A huge step was taken in 1932, when the Parish Room was wired for electric light, the work being undertaken by Mr Greenwood of Leathley. Fortnightly suppers continued. One item in the minutes might resonate with our present day providers of Last Friday Suppers, as Mr Blakeborugh stated that "the suppers have been gradually getting more elaborate, making it harder for those who gave the suppers". According to the minutes it was agreed that "the meal be limited to brown and white bread and butter, and one kind of cake". I am not sure how well that would go down at a last Friday Supper today! Meanwhile, the committee agreed unanimously to continue the tradition of a village Christmas Tree. Now wouldn't that be nice!

Lower Washburn Parish Council (LWPC)

The parish meeting was held at 8pm on 9 November in Leathley village hall. In addition to the parish councillors, Councillor Nathan Hull from North Yorkshire council attended.

The 20mph campaign was discussed and Councillor Hull informed the meeting that there were many requests for its introduction which was delaying the process. North Yorkshire County Council (NYCC) officials are therefore initially concentrating on speeding hotspots. Once again, we encourage vou to make personal representation to Councillor Hull and NYCC in favour of reduced speed limits in our parish: we need to keep up the pressure on NYCC. It would help us immensely if you could copy LWPC into your correspondence.

NYCC have informed parish councils that from April 2024 parishes will be responsible for funding parish by-elections. Our parish has taken the decision that rather than inflate our precept for an event that may not happen we would cover the costs from

within our reserves and seek to retrieve the amount from future precepts.

A grant of £800 was agreed for the refurbishment of the telephone kiosk at Stainburn with the work being carried out by the residents.

LWPC will make a contribution of £300 to be added to funding from Councillor Nathan Hull to support provision of a defibrillator at Castley.

The precept for 2024-2025 was discussed and raised from £9000 to £9750 to continue financing the services provided by the LWPC.

Finally, the next meeting of LWPC will be at 8pm on 11 January 2024 at Leathley Village Hall. It is an open meeting so please feel free to attend and or submit items for the agenda.

December Gardeners Corner



What a wet autumn it has been, but when the sun has shone the colours have been spectacular! The weather has been a bit of a

hindrance so now is the time to catch up on those jobs that were put off earlier. Do clear up the last of the fallen leaves from lawns, paths and flowerbeds, storing them separately to rot into wonderful leaf mould which will be a real tonic for your plants in future. Keep brushing paths to prevent algae from making them slippery and dangerous. Removing autumn leaves at the edges will also reduce hideouts for slugs!

It is a good idea to remove yellowing foliage from brassicas – sprouts, kale, purple sprouting etc – and remember that taller plants may need staking to combat wind rock and damage.

Blackcurrants fruit best on newer wood so prune now by cutting out some of the oldest woodiest stems. At the beginning of the month and when conditions allow, new blackcurrant bushes and raspberry

canes can still be planted. Pear and Apple trees can be pruned now. Plum trees should not be pruned until midsummer, as they may be susceptible to silver leaf fungus at this time of year.

Hellebores are among my favourite winter plants with so many varieties to choose from. December is a time to buy new ones which will reward you with a range of colours lasting right through to mid spring. Remember to remove old leaves on existing plants to help control the spread of disease.

Don't overwater houseplants. Indoor azaleas, cyclamen and forced bulbs giving festive colour will last longer in a cool spot, but poinsettias, hate the cold and draughts, so keep them in a warm cosy room.

Finally if you have a potted Christmas tree do keep it well watered. Mist growing and cut trees to keep them happy. Enjoy the festive season!




