alling all poppy makers for the Fewston Poppy Cascade project.



n Ordinary meeting of MWPC was held at Askwith Village Hall on 23rd August 2018.

All parishes were represented, along with HBC Cllr Wood the Clerk and 1 member of the public.

New councilor Robert Broderick was welcomed for the Denton parish.

The minutes from the Annual and Ordinary meeting on 17th May 2018 were adopted.

Under matters from the previous meeting the Clerk confirmed that efforts are still being made to get a replacement councilor for Langbar. It was agreed that a third mail drop should be done to all the houses in Langbar. Clerk to action this.

Highway matters items discussed included the problems of crossing over Ben Rhydding suspension bridge. The main problem is inconsiderate drivers but it was pointed out that drivers coming off the main road have priority. Clerk to write to NYCC and BMDC regarding cutting back vegetation around the bridge area. Cllr Broderick asked if the Clerk could write to Highways asking to get the bridge side repaired on the road near Lane End Farm. This had been damaged by contractors when the road was resurfaced some time ago.

Cllr Ellis, Cllr Chivers and Cllr Shepherd had attended a Planning workshop run by HBC. A 64 page document had been sent out by HBC as a follow up to the meeting. The MWPC councilor's that attended the meeting are to compile a short summary of the workshop which will be presented to the remaining MWPC councilors.

HBC wants to send all planning consultations via email and was asking for councils to complete a survey giving their views. MWPC does not agree with this electronic system and made comment of this on the survey

Neighbourhood Project CIC. This is a voluntary organisation asking for a £100 donation. They are targeting over 50s to improve Digital Literacy and are willing to spend up to 2 hours per session with a maximum of 8 sessions to help people with internet and computers. £50 of the monies goes on publicity flyers and £50 towards volunteer expenses. It was proposed Cllr Shepherd and carried that we donate the monies under section 137 of the council budget. Clerk to ask for a follow up report on the project when sending the monies.

Cllr Oldham reported that HBC now have a Local Lotto with 60p from each ticket going to local charities and volunteer groups. HBC are having open days to enable residents to look round the council offices. There is now as bus service from Otley into the Dales. ANOB have grants available to farmers and landowners to improve areas of their countryside.

Accounts were presented and adopted and planning matters were discussed with all planning matters and decisions available on the MWPC web site.

How much stuff do you have?

o you find it really hard to throw things away? You are not alone! But the problem is so serious for some people that hoarding has now been classified as a medical disorder. The World Health Organisation (WHO) says this could benefit thousands of people, because they will finally qualify for medical help.

But lots of us like our stuff without being ill. So, what does it take to 'qualify' as a real hoarder? (About 2 to 5 per cent of us exhibit some symptoms.) WHO defines it as someone with an 'accumulation of possessions due to excessive acquisition of, or difficulty discarding possessions, regardless of their actual value.' For example, a hoarder might have a cup of tea – but then be unable to throw away the used tea bag.

Signs of a problem hoarder include: keeping items of absolutely no value, such as junk mail and old newspapers; struggling to organise themselves and make decisions; an overattachment to various items; and increasing difficulty with everyday tasks.

The results can be awful: living spaces fill up with clutter that makes the proper use of the room impossible, and even dangerous. Such impairment will slowly ruin a person's personal, family, social, educational, and working life.

All In The Month Of October

00 years ago, on 29th Oct 1618 that Sir Walter Raleigh died. This famous English explorer, writer, poet and courtier was a favorite of Queen Elizabeth 1. Well known for popularising tobacco in England. Executed for treason by King James 1 (mainly to appease the Spanish).

100 years ago, on 1st Oct 1918 that British and Arab forces led by T. E. Lawrence (Lawrence of Arabia) captured the Syrian capital, Damascus, from the Turks.

80 years ago, on 30th Oct 1938 that Orson Welles' famous radio adaptation *War of the Worlds* by H. G. Wells' was broadcast in the USA. It allegedly caused nationwide outrage and panic as listeners thought the events described in the broadcast were real.

75 years ago, on 17th Oct 1943 that the Burma Railway (also known as the Death Railway of WW2) was completed. The Japanese built it using Asian laborer's and Allied prisoners-of - war, thousands of whom died. (One of the railway bridges is the famous Bridge over the River Kwai.)

60 years ago, on 13th Oct 1958 that the book 'A Bear Called Paddington' by British children's writer Michael Bond, was published. It marked the debut appearance of Paddington Bear.

50 years ago, on 5th Oct 1968 that a riot took place in Derry, Northern Ireland. A Northern Ireland Civil Rights Association march went ahead despite a government ban, as it took place at the same time as the loyalist Apprentice Boys. When the activists defied the ban, they were surrounded by Royal Ulster Constabulary and beaten. More than 100 people were injured, which sparked two days of rioting. The incident marked the beginning of the Troubles.

40 years ago, on 30th Oct 1978 that the Ugandan-Tanzanian war began which would see the downfall and ousting of Ugandan President Idi Amin (in April of the following year).

30 years ago, on 1st Oct 1988 that Mikhail Gorbachev became President of the Soviet Union.

10 years ago, on 7th Oct 2008 that the Financial Crisis began with an Icelandic bank that went into receivership. Within two days other banks began collapsing – and the crisis was underway.


