



News from Norwood Chapel

Dear Friends,

Let us rejoice, "Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!" Happy Easter to each and everyone of you. I hope you and those you love are able to celebrate this special time in the life of the Church in a special and meaningful way.

Easter means different things to different people. Many folks in our communities focus on the celebration of Spring with the Easter Bunny, Easter egg hunts and activities, and even a nice holiday during the 2-week school break.

The new life that is seen all around us in nature is life-giving, isn't it. Out in the fields spring lambs jump and run all around. Our gardens have reawakened, and flowers are blooming with the promise that more is to come. Daylight hours are increasing and maybe, just maybe, it's feeling a bit warmer by the time you read this!

And of course, in the church we celebrate Christ's Resurrection. That all is not as it appears . . . even though we cannot physically see him, Jesus has risen from the dead. He wasn't scared any longer. That to me is how God's love transforms our hearts and minds. The risen Lord is active and cares deeply about every moment of our lives.

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


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


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Coffee, Click & Connect

All in the month of April

It was:

250 years ago, on 18th April 1775 that American silversmith and folk hero Paul Revere made his famous midnight ride on horseback from Charleston to Lexington to warn residents that the British were about to attack.

Also 250 years ago, on 23rd April 1775 that I M W Turner, the British artist was born. Known for his landscapes and turbulent marine paintings.

175 years ago, on 16th April 1850 that Madame Marie Tussaud, French artist known for her wax sculptures, died. Founder of Madame Tussaud's wax museum in London.

Also 175 years ago, on 23rd April 1850 that William Wordsworth died. A Romantic poet, he was Poet Laureate from 1843-50.

150 years ago, on 1st April 1875 that Edgar Wallace was born. This British writer, playwright and journalist was best known for creating King Kong.

Also 150 years ago, on 17th April 1875 that the game of snooker was invented by Neville Chamberlain, a British army officer stationed in India.

125 years ago, from 14th April - 12th November, that the 1900 Paris Exposition, a World's Fair, was held. Nearly 50 million people visited Paris that year.

100 years ago, on 10th April 1925 that F Scott Fitzgerald's novel *The Great Gatsby*, was published.

80 years ago, from 1st April to 22nd June 1945 that the Battle of Okinawa, Japan took place. The largest amphibious assault in the Pacific War front, it was an Allied victory.

Also 80 years ago, on 30th April 1945 that Adolf Hitler, Chancellor of Germany (1933-45) and dictator (1934-45) committed suicide along with his wife, Eva Braun.

70 years ago, on 5th April 1955 that Prime Minister Winston Churchill announced his retirement because of failing health. He was succeeded by Anthony Eden on 7th April.

Also 70 years ago, on 10th April 1955 that British nightclub hostess Ruth Ellis shot and killed her lover. David Blakely. On 13th July she was hanged at Holloway Prison, the last woman to be executed in the UK.

Also 70 years ago, on 18th April 1955. that Albert Einstein, German-born American theoretical physicist, died, Considered the most influential physicist of the 20th century. Known for developing the special and general theories of relativity.

65 years ago, on 1st April 1960 that Dr Martens boots went on sale in the UK. 50 years ago, on 4th April 1975 that Microsoft, the computer software/ hardware company, was founded by Bill Gates and Paul Allen in Albuquerque New Mexico. Also 50 years ago, on 23rd April 1975 that US President Gerald Ford gave a televised speech in which he announced that the USA's involvement in the Vietnam war was over, and all US aid to South Vietnam had ended. The war itself ended on 30th April, when North Vietnamese forces captured the South Vietnamese capital Saigon. 40 years ago, on 21st April 1985 that Brazilian racing driver Ayrton Senna won the Portuguese Grand Prix. It was the first of his 41 Formula One wins.



The Birds in Your Garden

Adapting and specialising

I'm sure you've noticed that birds' beaks vary in shape and size to cope with their respective diets, but have you ever stopped to wonder how the different beaks work? A seed eating bird will need a strong beak capable of cracking husks to get at their kernels.

But even within seed eaters, competition for food means that further specialisation is needed to make the most of each type of seed. Finches are known for their diverse beak shapes, and each shape is linked to the bird's survival in its particular habitat. Natural selection plays a crucial role in shaping each bird's beak. They have strong jaw muscles and modified beaks with two grooves inside where they can lodge seeds and then use their tongues to rotate them as the mandibles do the crushing and dehusking.

But there is yet further specialisation to be found.

Chaffinches and Bramblings usually feed on the ground where disturbed soil has brought seeds to the surface, avoiding competition by targeting different size seeds, with the Chaffinch having a slightly smaller bill for smaller seeds.

Greenfinches prefer elm, Yew and hawthorn, and have large robust beaks to cope with these larger seeds. Goldfinches are even more specialist. They feed on small seeds, favouring

dandelions, thistles and Teasel, their fine, pointed bills allowing them to access the small seedheads.

Bullfinches prefer to peel the skin and pulpy flesh off their seeds, with short bills designed for the task.

Despite all this specialisation, finches will happily catch insects. Some species, such as Chaffinch and Goldfinch, will eat insects during the breeding season, and the majority of finch young are fed on easily digestible invertebrates.

Beaks are made up of two halves or mandibles, the outer layer of which is made of keratin (like our hair) and which, similarly, continues to grow and is worn down by everyday use. The upper mandible contains the nostrils at the base of the bill and both 불

nostrils at the base of the bill and both mandibles have cutting edges. The jaw muscles attach to the skull and lever the lower mandible allowing the bird to open and close its beak – the upper mandible does not move in most birds. 'Soft-billed' birds generally can't crack open hard seeds, with species like Wren and Starling having narrow bills to probe for insects. Starlings do have an extra feature to their beaks; their jaw muscles are extremely strong allowing them to open their beaks within the soil, uncovering insect larvae that might otherwise remain undiscovered. Blackbirds have a fruit-eaters' bill with a slightly hooked tip for plucking fruit and a broad base that allows them to swallow things that allows them to swallow things whole.

Short-term changes allow birds to adapt to their changing environment, for example, the shape of a bird's beak may alter during the year. A Great Tit's bill changes shape depending on what food is available. Adults eat seeds during the winter but switch to caterpillars in the spring. Subtle changes occur in their bills, which become longer and narrower during spring allowing them to feed more easily on invertebrates.

Looking to the future, and the inevitable heating of the world, it

seems that some species bodies are getting smaller while their beaks, from which they lose heat, are getting larger, providing more surface area to cool themselves. Whether this will be enough to help them survive, who knows?

Washburn Parish Council covers the areas of Blubberhouses, Fewston, Norwood and Timble. The Parish Council is the first tier of local government and is a body of volunteers elected to represent the views of their community.

At the meeting of Council in early March the Council discussed current issues in the parish around highways, planning and maintenance and updates on county matters.

30 years ago, on 4th April 1995 that Kenny Everett, DJ, comedian and TV entertainer, died. Known for his zany humour, characters and sketches.

Also 30 years ago, on 19th April 1995 that the Oklahoma City bombing took place. A truck bomb exploded outside the Alfred P Murrah Federal Building, killing 168 people and injuring 500 more. Timothy McVeigh was convicted of the bombing and executed in June 2001.

25 years ago, on 12th April 2000 that Queen Elizabeth II awarded the Royal Ulster Constabulary the George Cross in recognition of its collective and sustained bravery during the Troubles in Northern Ireland.

Gardeners Corner

March is such a fickle month with the old saying "In like a lion, out like a lamb". The start didn't feel very lion-like with calm, sunny days and high temperatures to confuse us all. Now April is here at last bringing a really busy time in the garden.

Hopefully the seeds sown indoors last month will have germinated. Pinch out the tops of sweet peas when about 3 - 4'' high to encourage them to bush up and produce more flowers. Harden off before planting outside later in the month. When showing their first true leaves, tomato seedlings should be potted up individually. Sow courgettes inside to bring on before planting out in May. Prepare the vegetable garden beds so that hardy vegetables such as carrots, leeks, spinach and beetroot can be sown outside later in the month. Do watch out for slugs though as they will enjoy feasting on any new shoots.

The potatoes that you chitted earlier should be planted, traditionally on Good Friday, this year on 18th April. They can successfully grow in large containers, placing them on about 3" of compost and covering over. Then






as the leaves begin to show continue to add more compost until eventually the container is full. Alternatively plant outside in well mucked drills and cover, earthing up as the shoots appear to protect them from any late frosts and to make sure forming tubers are not exposed to light.

Apply a mulch, such as well rotted manure, garden or mushroom compost, around fruit trees and across the garden to help retain moisture and suppress weeds. Hardy fuchsias can be pruned right back to healthy buds and if you haven't already pruned those wonderfully colourful winter stems of dogwoods and willows, these should be cut hard back to encourage next winter's colour. The prunings can be used as supports around the garden, although watch out as they can take root!




