

Washburn Valley Choir

I have some positive news about the Washburn Valley Choir after the long lockdown. A straw poll amongst the members has indicated that we would like to resume singing, and aim for our first get-together in early September. Of course circumstances may force a further delay, but at time of writing we are thankfully aware of a relaxation of the rules. We're keeping our fingers crossed...

The government has been very strict about communal singing up to now, some would say a little too strict, and choirs have been constantly lobbying for more reasonable treatment given that the scientific evidence is favourable and the vast majority of singers have been double-vaccinated. For the last year or so all choirs have been off limits, and we only achieved a relatively low number of Zoom sessions. Zooming has been a godsend for people to actually communicate with each other. Unfortunately for singing, it is not possible to sing and listen to others singing simultaneously - there is an inherent lag in the sound. The best that can be done is to sing along to a recording, or accompaniment. You cannot hear your fellow choir members – you are all on "mute"!

Some choirs (not us, I hasten to add, but for example *Leeds Guild of Singers* and Bradford Festival Choral Society) have managed to record individual voices and put together a composite sound, but that requires the skills of a veritable computer wizard....

One of the daunting tasks these days is finding people to sing. We are all getting older, and the pandemic, although thankfully not resulting in any serious illness amongst our members, has

meant that our singing voices are, shall we say, a little "rusty" through lack of usel

Our resumption, as I say, is likely to be in September, so I hope we will be able to join you to some degree in Harvest Festival celebrations.

Last but not least, I must give a mention to Gwyneth Petit, who, after several years of serving as a wonderfully efficient secretary to the choir, and supplying us with an extremely lovely alto voice, has decided to retire from choir duties. We managed to express our thanks with a delivery of flowers a few months ago and send her every good wish and hope that we will often see her around.

We are now very fortunate to have Sarah Soussan (what is it with alto dedication?!) to "replace the irreplaceable" and we wish Sarah all the



The Birds in Your Garden



Chiffchaffs

I've always considered the Chiffchaff to be a bit of an unlikely addition to my garden bird list, but when, this spring I kept hearing an unfamiliar repetitive noise - "chiffchaff, chiff-chaff" I wondered. Then I saw this little olive-brownish bird about the size of a Blue Tit with a bit of an eye stripe and a tendency to wag its tail. I was sure. Chiffchaffs are most often found in parks and gardens in the spring as they move towards their breeding grounds, but as their numbers increase, they seem to be appearing in gardens more regularly at other times. They are also known to join flocks of finches searching for food in early autumn.

One of several leaf warblers in the UK, Chiffchaffs are among the first of our small migrants to arrive and start singing, arriving in early March, though as the climate warms, more and more are staying the winter, particularly in the southern half of the country. They are visually very similar to Willow Warblers, and unless they are considerate enough to sing, you'll likely have problems telling them apart. The Willow Warbler produces a beautiful ascending and descending series of trills, a real contrast to the Chiffchaff's two metronomic notes.

Lord Grey captured the essence of the species

"Alone of all the warblers, the Chiffchaff has given us the right to expect him in March: he is the forerunner of the rush of song-birds that is on its way to us and will arrive in April, and thereafter enrich our woods, meadows and gardens with still further variety and quality of song. This is why the first hearing of a chiff-chaff moves us so each spring. He is a symbol, a promise and assurance of what is to come"

Both species breed throughout England and both are found in woodland edge and scrub habitats, with the Chiffchaff favouring the Email: magazine@washburnwharfemidbenefice.org.uk tops of trees and bushes. Their fortunes however, are very different. During the last two decades the Willow Warbler, which spends the winter in sub-Saharan Africa has, in common with many of our other long-distance migrants, seen its breeding population decline by half. Conversely, the Chiffchaff, which winters in Europe and North Africa has seen its numbers double to become one of the most abundant breeding warblers in Britain, with over a million breeding pairs.

Chiffchaffs are insectivorous, and prefer leaf insects such as caterpillars, gnats and midges.



Their ancient-Greek based family name *Phylloscopus* means "leaf" explorer", given because they tend to feed on the undersides of leaves where aphids congregate due to the build-up of sugary sap. They are also keen on flies, and so good is their aerial performance, that they can happily feed in mid-flight. Their species name Collybita refers to their song, being a corruption of the Greek kollubistes or 'money-changer', as the repeated notes were thought to resemble the jingling of coins.

There are generally two broods per

All in the month of August

It was:

250 years ago, on 15th August 1771. that Sir Walter Scott, Scottish historical novelist, poet, and playwright was born. His best-known works include Ivanhoe and Rob Rov. He is also responsible for the name given to the Dandie Dinmont Terrier dog.

Also 250 years ago, on 7th August 1771, that the first recorded ascent of Ben Nevis was made. Scottish botanist James Robertson ascended Ben Nevis. the highest mountain in the British Isles. Nowadays, 100,000 people per year make the ascent.

125 years ago, on 17th August 1896, that the death of the first person killed in a motor accident in the UK took place. Bridget Driscoll was crossing a road in the grounds of London's Crystal Palace when she was hit by a car giving demonstration rides. By way of contrast, Brake.org.uk report that nowadays, an average of five people a day die on UK roads.

90 years ago, on 19th August 1931, that the Yangtze River and Huai River floods peaked in China. It was one of the worst natural disasters of the 20th century; up to four million people died, and the floods lasted from July to November.

80 years ago, on 15th August 1941, that the German spy Josef Jakobs became the last person to be executed at the Tower of London. (He had parachuted into Britain during WWII.)

75 years ago, on 16th August 1946, that the Great Calcutta Killings took place in Kolkata India. Muslim and Hindu mobs rioted across the city following the Muslim League's

demand for the creation of Pakistan. More than 4,000 people were killed and 100,000 left homeless. The riot sparked further religious violence in other provinces, leading to the Partition of India in August 1947.

60 years ago, on 13th August 1961, that East Germany sealed off the border between East and West Berlin to prevent the exodus of refugees to the West. Initially barbed wire fences were erected; construction of the Berlin Wall began on 15th August. The border reopened in 1989.

50 years ago, on 9th August 1971, that Northern Ireland introduced internment, the power to detain suspected terrorists indefinitely without trial.


40 years ago, on 25th August 1981, that the US space probe Voyager 2 reached Saturn and sent back images

reached Saturn and sent back images and data. It travelled to Uranus (1986) and Neptune (1989) before reaching interstellar space in 2018. 43 years after launching, it is more than 11.8 billion miles from earth, but remains operational.

30 years ago, on 6th August 1991, that the first website (info.cern.ch) went live. The web's inventor, Tim Berners Lee, also posted a description of the World Wide Web project on the alt.hypertext newsgroup, and provided a link to download the first web browser, which could only run on NeXT workstations.

Also 30 years ago, from 19th to 21st August 1991, that there was an attempted coup in the Soviet Union when hard-line members of the Communist Party tried to seize control

from President Mikhail Gorbachev. The coup failed after three days and eventually led to the collapse of communism and the disintegration of the Soviet Union. On 29th August the Supreme Soviet suspended all Communist Party activities.

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Recipe Chicken Cacciatore



an easy light dish perfect with green salad and garlic bread alfresco on a warm summer evening

Serves 4

Ingredients

8 boneless, skinless chicken thighs, halved

2 onions, chopped

2 cloves garlic, finely chopped

I red pepper, chopped

1 yellow pepper, chopped

2 small courgettes, sliced

2 tins chopped tomatoes

Splash white wine

Salt

Black pepper

Dried oregano

Fresh basil leaves, roughly torn Tablespoon olive oil Handful pitted black olives

Method

- Heat oil in large wide bottomed pan, and onions and garlic and fry gently until soft
- Add peppers, courgettes, basil, tomatoes and wine, bring to boil and season to taste
- Add chicken and simmer covered for 30 minutes – until chicken is cooked through. Can be cooled after this for reheating later.
- Add olives and adjust seasoning if necessary
- Serve piping hot

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
