Dear Friends,


It's that time of the year where we prepare to celebrate once again the birth of Jesus. As a church we do this by decorating our sanctuaries with candles, Advent wreaths, Christmas trees and fairy lights; we sing carols that highlight the coming of the Saviour; we re-tell the Nativity story through word, song and sometimes drama. I have had the great pleasure of welcoming school groups to one of my churches in order to perform the Nativity for their parents. This re-enactment helps the children really learn the story and to put themselves in Mary and Joseph's shoes, so-to-speak.

Most of us know that when Mary and Joseph first start looking for a room in Bethlehem, they are turned away because there is no room in the inn. This happens multiple times in Nativities plays . . . and sometimes this is where the children's personalities truly shine because they shout out, "Sorry, there's no room!" Eventually, tired Mary and Joseph find a place. A gracious inn keeper shows them the outdoor stable and this is where Jesus is born.

It was:

200 years ago, on 27th December 1822 that Louis Pasteur, French biologist, microbiologist, and chemist was born. One of the fathers of germ theory, he was best known for the pasteurisation process, which is named in his honour.

100 years ago, on 8th December 1922 that Lucian Freud, German-born British figurative artist and draughtsman was born. One of the leading portrait artists of the 20th century.

Also 100 years ago, on 14th December 1922 that John Reith (later Lord Reith) was appointed as General Manager of the BBC.

Also 100 years ago, on 30th December 1922 that the Soviet Union was founded. Officially known as the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR), it was dissolved in 1991.

90 years ago, on 25th December 1932 that the first Royal Christmas Message was broadcast on radio. King George V addressed the nation live from Sandringham.

80 years ago, on 1st December 1942 that the British Government published the Beveridge Report, which formed the basis of the welfare state.

Also 80 years ago, on 17th December 1942 that British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden told the House of Commons about the mass executions of Jews by the Nazis in occupied Europe. Ministers and Members of Parliament condemned the massacres and held a minute's silence as a mark of respect for the victims.

65 years ago, on 25th December 1957

that Queen Elizabeth II's Christmas message was televised for the first

50 years ago, on 22nd December 1972 that 14 people were found alive in the Andes more than two months after their plane crashed. They had survived by eating dead passengers.

40 years ago, on 12th December 1982 that 30,000 women joined hands around the Greenham Common RAF base in Berkshire to protest against the siting of US Cruise missiles there.

25 years ago, on 11th December 1997 that Sinn Fein president Gerry Adams met Prime Minister Tony Blair at 10 Downing Street – the first Irish Republican leader to do so since Michael Collins in 1921.

Also 25 years ago, on 11th December 1997 that the Kyoto Protocol, aimed at reducing greenhouse gases and combating global warming, was adopted at a conference in Japan. More than 190 countries have signed the agreement, which came into effect in February 2005.

20 years ago, on 7th December 2002 that Iraq submitted a weapons declaration to the United Nations in which it said it had no weapons of mass destruction. This was part of the prelude to the March 2003 Invasion of

10 years ago, on 9th December 2012 that Patrick Moore, British astronomer, television presenter and musician died. Best known for hosting the astronomy series The Sky at Night (1957-2013) the longest-running TV series with the same presenter.

The Birds in Your Garden



Columbidae - Pigeons

This is a family of some three hundred species, most of which are found in the tropics. You may love them or hate them, but they are everywhere! The distinction between pigeons and doves is not a taxonomic one, with the term dove tending to be used for the smaller varieties.

Pigeons are famed for their homing ability; from Roman or even Persian times, via the siege of Paris to World War 2, they were used to carry messages. When far from home they use the sun as a compass and can compensate for its movement across the sky; closer to home it seems they use local landmarks to navigate.

Feral or city pigeons are found in cities the world over and are derived from the Rock Dove. Such has been their success that true Rock Doves probably only exist in the wildest corners of northern Europe and Asia. They chose to desert their natural habitat and associate with mankind due to the ready availability of food combined with the breeding and roosting potential offered by buildings, which resemble the cliff faces on which they naturally breed.

Woodpigeon courting is particularly obvious in spring, with much cooing and preening together with explosive nearly vertical short flights and much clapping of wings. Their breeding season never seems to end, and they are regularly recorded having young in their nests from February to November.

This extended breeding season is only possible because, like all pigeons,



Woodpigeons produce 'crop milk' which is similar to mammalian milk in its composition. It is produced in the crop, a sac-like structure normally used for storing food. This allows the young to be fed even when suitable food is not available.

Pigeons like to eat cabbage, sprouts, peas and grain and one reason for their recent proliferation is the availability of autumn sown brassicas, such as oil seed rape. They will also eat buds, shoots, seeds, nuts and berries, and in autumn can often be seen sitting on cotoneaster or pyracantha hedges.

The Collared Dove, another of the commoner birds in Britain, is pinkygrey with a distinctive black band on its neck. They first bred in the UK in Cromer in 1955, having spread naturally from their ancestral haunts in Turkey and the Middle East. More recently their numbers have fallen: results from the BTO's Garden Bird-Watch show that the Collared Dove has declined by a quarter in the last decade while the Woodpigeon population has increased. Are the two changes linked or is something else responsible?

Woodpigeons have done particularly well in south-east England and East Anglia, probably due to altered agricultural practices. Autumn rather than spring sown cereals and oil seed rape have led to green foods being available all year round, improving overwinter survival and allowing a longer breeding season.

The Collared Dove population, on the other hand, has been declining throughout the country since 2005. One reason for this could be the in-

creasing Woodpigeon numbers, the two birds perhaps competing for similar food and habitat. We can't completely blame the Woodpigeon though. Around the same time as the decline started, trichomonosis, a disease that only affects birds, spread from pigeons and doves to Greenfinches and other small birds. increasing its prevalence in the environment. It is thought that Collared Doves could be more susceptible to trichomonosis than Woodpigeons and that the rise in disease incidents might be having an effect on the Collared Dove population

Gardeners Corner



The year is drawing to a close, but there are still jobs to do in the garden. Tidy up around winter vegetables, such as kale, purple sprouting and other brassicas by removing any yellow leaves as these may harbour pests; give them a good weed around as well. If like me you live in a windy spot, it may also be necessary to stake the taller plants to prevent wind damage - my purple sprouting really took a battering in Storm Arwen last year. Bare areas of the veg plot where summer veg have been removed will benefit from the addition of a good mulch of compost ready for next year.

A bit of pruning won't go amiss now. Blackcurrants fruit better on new wood so it is a good idea to cut out up to a third of the old woody stems as well as any weaker ones. Apples and pears will also benefit from some pruning to maintain a good shape and remove any diseased twigs.

I always look forward to the winter flowering plants in the garden.

Hellebores put on a lot of green growth during the year. Their foliage can be cut back so that the flowers can be appreciated fully.

So far we have had a mild autumn, but once the frosts arrive, try to avoid walking on the lawn as the brittle frozen grass will be damaged, leaving unsightly black footprints. Any fallen leaves not raked up last month should also be cleared away, allowing more light to get to the grass.

Finally, look after those indoor plants which bring such joy at this time of year. Cyclamen, azaleas and bulbs in pots will all last longer in a cool position. However, Poinsettias need a good light and consistent warm temperature well away from draughts. Don't over water any of them, but wait until the surface is almost dry.

Enjoy the season - a time to reflect what worked well during the year and to plan for the next one!


