It is only when we have a power cut that we realise just how much we rely on electricity for our everyday life. Even when we know we are in the middle of a power cut we still instinctively go to switch on the light when we go into another room and realise how silly we are being. If you are like me, it's then we realise that we should have put the kettle on 5 minutes ago when we first thought of having a cup of tea! 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










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All in the month of June

It was:

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200 years ago, on 16th June 1824, that a London vicar, Arthur Broome, and some 22 of his friends, including the MPs William Wilberforce (anti-slavery campaigner) met at Old Slaughters Coffee House to found the SPCA - the first national animal protection society in the world. By1840 Queen Victoria had given permission for it to be called the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

150 years ago, on 22nd June 1874, that the first lawn tennis sets went on sale in London. They included balls, racquets, a net, poles, court markers, and instructions. They were designed by Walter Clopton Wingfield, who is credited with having invented modern lawn tennis. Wimbledon began hosting international lawn tennis championships in 1877.

125 years ago, on 19th June 1899 that Anglo-Egyptian Sudan was established. It was granted independence in 1956 as the Republic of Sudan. South Sudan gained its independence in 2011. On 15th April 2023, violent clashes erupted between the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF) in Sudan, resulting in the displacement of more than 8.6 million people. There are currently about 25 million people in need of aid in Sudan.

100 years ago, on 8th June 1924 that George Mallory, British mountaineer, disappeared on Mount Everest. His body was found in 1999.

90 years ago, on 30th June 1934 was the Night of the Long Knives: Hitler's execution of a number of senior Nazi officials and hundreds of other (perceived) political opponents.

80 years ago, on 6th June 1944 that D-Day and the Normandy Landings took place. More than 150,000 Allied troops landed on the beaches of Normandy. The Battle of Normandy ended on 25th August. Allied victory.

Also 80 years ago, on 13th June 1944 that Germany launched the first V-1 flying bomb ('doodlebug') attack on London. 9,521 V-1s were fired at London and south-east England during the war.

75 years ago, on 8th June 1949 that George Orwell's novel Nineteen Eighty -Four was published.

70 years ago, on 7th June 1954 that Alan Turing, British mathematician, logician, cryptanalyst, and computer scientist died. Noted for his

scientist died. Noted for his contributions to code-breaking during World War 2. Considered the father of theoretical computer science and artificial intelligence. Prosecuted for his homosexuality.

60 years ago, on 4th June 1964 that the Beatles' first world tour was held. Over two months they played 30 concerts in seven countries, beginning in Copenhagen.

50 years ago, on 28th June 1974 that chemists at the University of California, Irvine, published the first report that warned that chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs) could damage the Earth's ozone layer. CFCs were widely used in refrigerators, air conditioning systems and as aerosol propellants.



The Birds in Your Garden



Cuckoo migration

Have you heard a Cuckoo? This year, last year, when?

Like many migrant birds, the Cuckoo is in long-term decline as a breeding bird in Britain, and is on the Red List of Birds of Conservation Concern. Their breeding behaviour has been very well-studied, but until recently, knowledge of their migratory behaviour was very limited.

In 2011, a BTO team set out to change this, using satellite-tags to track the migration movements of male Cuckoos from different parts of Britain. Males specifically because the females, being smaller, might be affected by the weight of the tags, even though it's only a few grams.

This work has not only revealed details of Cuckoos' migration timings and wintering grounds, but has also showed "our" breeding birds take one of two routes south to Africa. Crucially, different rates of mortality have been found on these two routes, which strongly correlate with population declines. Birds either migrated southwest via Spain and Morocco or southeast via Italy or the Balkans before converging in the Congo basin of central Africa.

Cuckoos taking the Spanish route were more likely to die before completing the Sahara crossing, even though their route was shorter. There was no difference in survival rates between the two routes south of the Sahara, or during their return journeys to the UK. This difference in survival rates

provides the first direct evidence that conditions encountered during migration have an impact on population numbers. In general, English Cuckoos, whose numbers have declined more, take the west route, and Scottish and Welsh birds, the east, along which fewer birds are lost.

Despite having to cross the Sahara, most of the mortality on the western route occurred in Spain, suggesting that conditions at sites where they stop en route to feed are responsible. Ín recent years, Spain has suffered droughts and wildfires, which will have reduced significantly the availability of food, although other factors like large-scale habitat change might also have played a role. One way of reducing losses en route may well be to improve the environment around the known feeding points, and this is being looked at.

As well as the problems en route, declines in the Cuckoos' main food source in the UK (caterpillars of large moths) were also particularly severe in areas in which birds migrating on the west route were tagged. The fact that the western route is still used despite its apparent disadvantages suggests that these changes have arisen recently.

This study shows how conditions during migration can influence the survival of long-distance migrants, and underlines the need for a full annual-cycle approach to understanding migratory birds and their conservation needs. This is something which not only affect Cuckoos, but also many other migrants too. Yet another effect

other migrants too. Yet another effect of climate change.

What's next?

The BTO plans to look more closely at how dependent Cuckoos are on the drought-busting rains of the west African weather frontal system, known as the Inter Tropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ). This rain produces the food they need to fatten up before heading back to breed in the UK, and its timing is critical to their arrival back here where spring is getting ever earlier. If the birds whose nests they parasitise lay earlier, the Cuckoos need to get

back earlier too, but the ITCZ seems not to be moving.






A Midsummer supper: history with a twist, Thursday 20th June, 6.30pm -9.30pm

Help the Trust remove Invasive Species!

Yorkshire Dales River Trust (YDRT) is a registered charity working to enhance and protect the rivers of the Yorkshire Dales. By working in partnership with landowners, businesses, land managers and the public, we care for the rivers, streams and catchments of the rivers Swale, Ure, Nidd, Wharfe and Ouse as sources of pure water and as habitats for aquatic and other wildlife. Through our award winning Rivers2U mobile classroom we also engage with schools and communities to help children and the wider public gain a better understanding of our rivers and their associated habitats.

Our growing volunteer programme is a key work strand broadening our reach our funded larger scale

projects. YDRT volunteers undertake a wide range of activities invaluable to supporting and enhancing river health. These include surveying, sampling and monitoring rivers and also carrying out practical tasks such as tree planting, leaky dam building and river clean ups.

With spring and early summer being the best time for removing Invasive Non Native Species (INNS) from our rivers and becks we are now looking for landowners and volunteers to help us with this. One of the most prevalent species, Himalayan Balsam grows and spreads quickly, reaching heights of 2M, so crowding out our

native species which are essential for the biodiversity of riparian borders. Dying back to nothing, the plant also leaves banks bare, exposed and susceptible to erosion throughout the winter months.

There are three ways you can get involved and help us and Yorkshire Wildlife Trust:

- 1. If you own land beside Timble Beck or the Washburn between Lindley and Swinsty please get in touch as we'd like to include your land in our INNS removal project.
- 2. If you'd like to join us as a volunteer and learn how to spot and remove Himalayan Balsam and other INNS - get in touch. Full \(\text{\figs} \)
- 3. Did you know you can pull up

and other INNS - get in touch. Full training given and no prior experience is required.

Did you know you can pull up Himalayan Balsam if you see it on a Right of Way? Please help by doing this if you are sure you have identified the species correctly.

Educing the hold this plant has in the Washburn Valley will help to proct becks and rivers, reducing ankside erosion and improving abitats for many species including white Clawed Crayfish.

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

Gardeners Corner



What a wonderful spring we have enjoyed with the daffodils and all the blossom looking magnificent and holding on to their flowers for ages. Tulips have been really gorgeous this year. They don't always come back in following years but if you deadhead them as soon as the flowers have faded and then give them a top dressing of bone meal or a liquid fertiliser high in potassium, this will help the bulbs to replenish the energy expended on this year's blooms always worth a try. Daffodils too having been deadheaded will benefit from a liquid feed. Don't be tempted to cut them back until the foliage has turned yellow, when bulbs flowering in grass can also be mown.

When adding lawn clippings to the compost heap make sure you add brown matter such as torn up cardboard or prunings. Compost can be regularly turned too to keep it working. Now is the time to trim lawn edges with a spade to stop the grass growing into the flower beds, saving time on weeding later.

Cut back early flowering perennials, such as pulmonaria which will encourage new leaves and help

prevent mildew from forming. Oriental poppies, lupins and delphiniums can also be cut right back after flowering. Climbing plants and sweet peas should be tied into their supports. Sweet peas are hungry and thirsty so do feed and water regularly. Tall perennials are coming into their own now and will need staking to prevent them flopping and protect from any wind damage. Keep deadheading to prolong the flowering period, especially with repeat flowering roses.

Vegetables, such as courgettes, brought on in the greenhouse should be hardened off now before planting in their final positions. Gradually bring them out during the day but shelter them again at night for a good few days to acclimatise them to the outside world. Sweetcorn is wind pollinated so should be planted in squares rather than long rows.

40 years ago, on 3rd to 6th June 1984 that Indian government troops stormed the Golden Temple in Amritsar, which was being held by a Sikh militant group. More than 1,000 people were killed, including the group's leader. The resulting anger and fighting led to the assassination of Prime Minister Indira Ghandi that autumn.

30 years ago, on 6th June 1994 that the highest individual score in first-class cricket was achieved. Brian Lara scored 501 not out while playing for Warwickshire against Durham. It is the only score of 500 or more in first-class cricket history.

25 years ago, on 8^{th} June 1999 that former British cabinet minister Jonathan Aitken was sentenced to 18 months in prison for perjury and perverting the course of justice after he admitted lying during a libel action against The Guardian newspaper and Granada TV. He served seven months. and is the only British cabinet minister to have been imprisoned.

15 years ago, on 25th June 2009 that Michael Jackson 'the King of Pop', American singer, songwriter, and dancer, died of an anaesthetic overdose, aged 50. His hit songs included Thriller, Bad, and Black or White.

10 years ago on the 18th June King Juan Carlos I of Spain abdicated the Spanish throne to make way for his son Felipe VI

Ingredients

1 Tablespoon of Mustard 2 Tablespoon's of Vinegar 3 tablespoons of Cream A root of horseradish.

- Either leave in the bowl and cover or place in a jar for longer storage. Leave for at least two days the flavours to have chance to mature.
