The View from the Villages

The forty days of Lent, are associated with self-discipline and prayer. In the first instance, the tradition is that we give up something we enjoy, possibly chocolate or alcohol. I have a friend who does not eat meat in Lent and abstains from alcohol, in many ways he represents the highest ideal in maintaining a good Lent. Personally, I find this element of selfdiscipline, impossible to emulate.

We are also encouraged to make time for prayer and reflection, many books are written every year to encourage individuals to make time by offering simple reflections that can be used easily on a day to day basis. The national Church also produces a Lent programme that can be both used by groups and individuals.

In a Benefice like ours, bringing people together in groups is not easy, this said each of our individual churches might be able to arrange one or two sessions for shared reflection during Lent. We might also like to participate in the diocesan retreat in Ripon Cathedral on March 11th.

The importance of Lent is that each one of us makes time for sharing in the forty days that Jesus spent in the wilderness. It is never easy to find the self-discipline that makes for a good Lent, this is in part one of the challenges that we are all called to face.

An important element of Lent is that it is a time for spiritual renewal, at a personal level, we can do this without feeling that we are metaphorically covering ourselves in sack cloth and ashes. In the gospel reading for Ash Wednesday, we a reminded of the words of Jesus in Matthew 6:1:

Beware of practising your piety before others in order to be seen by them; for then you have no reward from your Father in Heaven.

I hope that all of us in our own simple way will be able to find a way of keeping a Holy Lent, and in the words of one of my favourite lent books, written by a Roman Catholic priest, '*Pardon My Lenten Smile'*, the message is the perfect antidote to those who spoil Lent with trying too hard for piety.

Lent well kept, is the perfect preparation for a creative Holy Week and a joyful Easter. - Terry Drummond

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








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All in the month of March

It was:

300 years ago, on 8th March 1723 that Sir Christopher Wren, English architect, died. Best known for designing St Paul's Cathedral.

125 years ago, on 16th March 1898 that Aubrev Beardsley, British illustrator, died. His black ink drawings, influenced by Japanese woodcuts, contributed to the development of Art Nouveau.

100 years ago, on 4th March 1923 that Patrick Moore, the amateur astronomer, TV presenter, writer and musician was born. Best known for presenting the TV astronomy show The Sky at Night for over 50 years. (Died 2012)

80 years ago, on 13th March 1943 that the final liquidation of Krakow Ghetto in Poland took place. 8,000 Jews were transported to Plaszow labour camp, 2000 more were simply killed in the streets, and the rest were sent to Auschwitz.

70 years ago, on 19th March 1953 that the Academy Awards ceremony (the Oscars) were televised for the first time.

Also 70 years ago, on 26th March 1953 that Dr Jonas Salk announced that he had completed the first small-scale test of a polio vaccine. Larger tests began in February 1954, and mass vaccinations began in April 1955.

65 years ago, on 2nd March 1958 that the first land crossing of Antarctica was completed by the Commonwealth Trans-Antarctic Expedition, led by Vivian Fuchs. The team of 12 men travelled 2,158 miles from Shackleton Base to Scott Base (via the South Pole) in 99 days, using six vehicles.

60 years ago, on 22nd March 1963 that the British Secretary of State for War, John Profumo, made a statement in the House of Commons in which he denied there was any impropriety in his relationship with Christine Keeler, a model who was also in a sexual relationship with a drug dealer and a Soviet naval attaché. (In June he admitted he had lied, and resigned.)

50 years ago, on 8th March 1973 that the citizens of Northern Ireland voted in a referendum to remain within the United Kingdom. That same day the IRA carried out its first bombing in Britain since WWII, planting car bombs in London. One person died, 200 were injured.

40 years ago, on 6th March 1983 that Donald Maclean, British-born Soviet spy died. He was a member of the Cambridge Spy Ring.

Also 40 years ago, on 26th March 1983, that Anthony Blunt, British art historian and Soviet spy, died. 25 years ago, on 16th March 1998 that Rwanda began mass trials for the country's 1994 genocide. There were 125,000 suspects for 500,000 murders. 20 years ago, on 1st March 2003 that Khalid Sheikh Mohammed, the al-Qaeda terrorist who masterminded the 9/11 attacks on the USA, was captured in Pakistan. Also 20 years ago, on 12th March 2003 that the World Health Organisation issued a global alert about a severe form of pneumonia (now known as Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome – SARS) that was affecting people in China, Hong Kong and Vietnam.

Lower Washburn Parish Council

Some items of interest.

Parish members have voted to increase the parish precept from £8500 to £9000 for the financial year 2023/2024 in order to continue financing the services provided by the council.

During the last 12 months there have been two occasions of dead animals in the river at Castley and considering this to be a health issue the animal carcases were removed quickly and disposed of by an authorised contractor.

As has been mentioned previously it is important for local residents to add their concerns when there is a planning application to which they disagree. However, this doesn't always achieve the result they or the parish wish for. A recent planning application for a change of use to a holiday let was received and this had caused concern previously as the property had been used for Airbnb with some annoyance to neighbours. The parish objected strongly to this application with what was thought to be strong arguments against. Neighbours also objected but unfortunately the application was passed.

Farnley parish members are concerned that although there is a 20mph restriction in the estate on the Leeds side of Farnley Lane there isn't one on the Riverside estate. Therefore, members will be pressing North Yorkshire council to seek authority to introduce a 20mph limit.

In 2012 the parish purchased for the sum of £1 the redundant BT telephone kiosk at Stainburn but it has deteriorated over the years and steps

are now being taken to restore the kiosk.


The recent heavy rains have shown that some gulleys and culverts under the highways are blocked. Our parish caretaker usually clears small blockages but recently there have been blockages which require North Yorkshire Highways to take action and these were reported to the authority using the app "what 3 words" to pinpoint the location of the problem. May I suggest that if you are going to report a pothole, blocked gulley etc you use the app to give an accurate location.

The Birds in Your Garden

Nest boxes

I'm sure you've heard the ever increasing amount of chatter from the birds in and around your garden, as well as seeing the ever more confrontational behaviour of some of them. They will be looking for nesting opportunities too, and it's not too late to put out some nest boxes if you haven't already done so.

The loss of hedgerow trees, changes to woodland management and increasing urbanisation have all contributed to a decline in natural sites for cavity-nesting species like Blue Tit and Starling. Others, such as House Sparrow and Swift, have also lost out to changing building regulations, which have reduced the opportunities for nesting under roof tiles or in holes in bargeboards.

Well-designed nest boxes can replace these lost opportunities, increasing the numbers of nesting birds, and providing an opportunity to collect valuable data. If you've not considered the idea before, here are some suggestions for which type of box to choose, and where to put it.

Bird Watel

Commercially available nest boxes come in many shapes and sizes: some provide a perfect breeding cavity for birds, whilst others are far from ideal.

• Boxes should be made from an insulating material such as wood (external treatment with a water based preservative is OK) or a special waterproof wood/concrete compound. Metal or ceramic walled boxes can become too hot or too cold for chicks to survive.



- A box with a 32mm entrance hole is ideal for small birds such as sparrows and tits. One with a 28 mm hole will only be used by Blue Tits. Open fronted boxes will be used by Robins, Blackbirds and others.
- Birds may lay fewer eggs in smaller boxes, so the internal floor area should at least 130cm².
- Avoid boxes incorporating a bird table as the nesting and feeding birds may come into conflict, or with perches which may act as a foothold for squirrels to reach into the box and grab eggs or chicks
- A good box should provide easy access for human observers to record its contents and to clean out the disused nesting material at the end of the season.

Where you put your nest box is every bit as important as what it looks like. The highest priority must be to provide a safe and comfortable environment for birds to nest successfully.

- Not too close to another nest box, and away from bird feeders nest boxes of the same type should not be sited too close together as this may promote aggressive behaviour between neighbours.
- Shelter your box from adverse weather the front should be angled slightly downwards to prevent rain from entering..
- Small-hole boxes are best placed 1 -3m above ground on tree trunks don't let foliage obscure the entrance hole, a clear flight path is important. If there are no trees in your garden, then fasten your box to a post, a shed or a wall.

- Open-fronted nest boxes should be hidden from view, ideally by foliage.
- Make sure it is not easily accessible to predators (cats and squirrels).

For more details, have a look at the BTO website, or their booklet 'Nestboxes: your complete quide' which contains step-by-step instructions for constructing nest boxes for several species.

Having put up your box, it's well worth joining BTO's Nesting Neighbours scheme to help build a detailed picture of bird breeding success and what may be affecting it.

Remember, nest boxes are sometimes used more than once and birds like Robin, Blackbird and Collared Dove may make two or even three nesting attempts over the spring and summer.

Gardeners Corner



Haven't the snowdrops been magnificent this year? Now is the time to dig up some clumps, split them and replant to extend the display; they prefer being moved "in the green" rather than planted as dry bulbs in the autumn.

Willows and dogwoods have also provided wonderful winter colour, but they can be cut right back now. The pruned stems make useful plant supports. It is also still time to plant new trees and shrubs; a square hole is best to encourage the roots outwards. Do make sure they are well watered if the weather becomes really hot and dry later in the season.

Check the sweet peas sown last month and sow some more to prolong the flowering season. It's also time to sow tomatoes in the greenhouse and some tagetes too as these help keep the whitefly away. Next month will be busy with more seed sowing. Do make sure you have bought yours so that you have the varieties you want. Early in the month mature rhubarb crowns can be lifted and split with a

spade. The outer healthy sections complete with roots and the gorgeous red bud can be replanted and the woody old centres discarded. They are hungry plants so do give them a good mulch of well-rotted manure or compost. If your perennials have become overcrowded, they too can be divided now to help maintain vigorous healthy growth. Given a good mulch they will reward you with a wonderful display later on.

Continue weeding to avoid established weeds fighting for nutrition, light and water and keep a watchful eye out for slug damage. Slugs are voracious eaters and love all the new growth that spring brings. I find a torch and sharp knife at night works very well at keeping the population down.


